Earlier this year, she also won the 2014 Metropolitan Opera National Council Auditions, and this spring, Amanda made her Met debut as Tebaldo in Verdi's Don Carlo.

Cecelia Hall's recent roles have included Zerlina in Don Giovanni with Opera Philadelphia, a Spotlight Recital with The Song Continues at Carnegie Hall, and a return to Lyric Opera of Chicago to sing Annio in La Clemenza di Tito. She also has returned to the Metropolitan Opera as Javotte in Manon.

David Won made his Seattle Opera debut in the spring 2010 in two roles: Ford in Falstaff and the Doctor in Daron Hagen's world premiere of Amelia, as well as his Opera Carolina debut as Marcello in La Bohème. Mr. Won recently returned to The Metropolitan Opera to perform Gregorio in Romeo et Juliette and cover Belcore in L'Elisir d'Amore. He also marked his debuts with the Nashville Opera in Carmen, and his Lyric Opera of Kansas City in Così Fan Tutte. Kevin Short is thrilling audiences around the globe in a wide range of repertoire ranging from Mozart's Die Entführung aus dem Serail and Monteverdi's L'incoronazione di Poppea, to Verdi's Attila and Don Carlos, and Bizet's Carmen. Kevin has performed multiple roles with the over 25 companies in North America and has performed with over 20 companies throughout Europe.
