# CELEBRATING 90 YEARS THE GRAND THEATER | 1927-2017

## A HISTORY OF EXCELLENCE

### Over 100 Years as an "Arts Block"

For over 100 years, the land bounded by 4th and Jefferson, 5th and Scott Streets has been a block for the arts; tracing its origins back to the Grand Opera House. The 890-seat opera house was a popular venue for musical and theatrical acts, making Wausau a stop on the theatrical circuit. Built in the same location of the current-day Grand Theater in 1899, the block where it stood has been considered an "arts block" ever since.

Almost 30 years later, on Thanksgiving Day, November 24, 1927, the new 1470-seat Grand Theater opened its doors to a full house with music, and the screening of *Dress Parade*, featuring actor William Boyd.

The Grand Theater was a front-runner of the era in theater engineering and technologies. The silent films were accompanied by the Kilgen Wonder Organ, with its ten ranks of pipes rising two stories in height; while "talkies" such as *The Jazz Singer* were welcomed with perfect acoustics, designed for the theater's live performances.

Except for a brief period in the 1930s when the Great Depression affected audience attendance,

The Grand Theater remained the focal point of entertainment in the Wausau area, bringing in Hollywood Blockbusters such as *Gone with the Wind*, Disney's *Fantasia*, and *Star Wars* as well as the performing arts including vaudeville, local talent nights, and more.

In 1987 a \$2.2 million project restored The Grand Theater's original luster and upgraded technical systems for the big sound and bright lights required by the touring shows of the modern era. The Grand Theater re-opened in May of 1987 with five nights of music and dance including performances by *The Legends of Bluegrass*, Banu Gibson featuring the New Orleans Hot Jazz Orchestra, and the musical One Mo' Time.

With the formation of the Performing Arts Foundation in 1972, The Grand Theater was reborn, the stage enlivened with music, theater, and dance from around the world. Including esteemed acts such as BB King, The Tokyo String Quartet, Broadway's JERSEY BOYS, Itzhak Perlman, Alvin Ailey American Dance Theater, Aretha Franklin, Little Big Town, Rosanne Cash, Kelsea Ballerini, and so many more.
